




#### Victimization- many pathways Abuse Domestic abuse-1 in 3 women Sexual Emotional Drugs and Alcohol Mental Illness History of childhood physical abuse, neglect, sexual abuse

#### Pregnancy-many reasons

Bonding – "he won't leave me" Protection- "he will treat me better" Unconditional love Someone to nurture them Special attention

#### Childbearing-

Are more likely teen at time of first birth
Poor prenatal care
Lack psychological, emotional and financial resources to care for her children
High rate of poverty

2 vs 3-4 children- break point for working

### Child Abuse, Neglect and Sexual Abuse

Teen Pregnancy
Larger families
Low education
Low self worth
Poverty
Oklahoma- over 14,000 cases of proven abuse and neglect

#### **Sexual Abuse**

Usually tell someone/often not believed
Up to 96% of abusers are relatives or an adult known by the family
30% of sexual abusers are family, <age 6 it is 50%</li>
Child often feels trapped
Confused sexual boundaries

#### **Sexual Abuse**

- More common with teens moms
- Maternal age was a greater predictor of abuse when compared to social, economic and personal factors
- Lack of emotion involvement online grooming

### Age of Awareness

- Sexual Grooming begins before age 5
- Pornography to normalize behavior
- Starts as game with rewards
- Confusion- wrong but emotionally/physically pleasurable
- Age 13-14 there is an understanding of the abusive relationship

#### Runaway/Throwaway

- Sexual assault is one of the primary reasons for leaving home
- Emotionally naïve about street life
- 1.5 million runaway each year/ 500,000 not reported

#### **On the Street**

•Average age of entry into prostitution is 13-14

•75% of girls, 44% of boys report survival sex

•Strong "supply and demand" effect for underage girls due to societal sexualization of girls

#### Pathway to Prison

•93% of girls is the juvenile justice system were victim of physical/sexual abuse
•Mental health services in the JJS are lacking
•Drugs are used to cope with prostitution and street life
•Having sex for drugs is different than having sex for money

#### Pregnancy

•Lack of power, need for money and drugs leads to unprotected sex

•45% of incest survivors have an adolescent pregnancy

•Girls who give birth <17 have 4x rate of sexual abuse

#### Pregnancy

•No or fragmented prenatal care

•Baptist 25% test + for drugs

Increase in Methamphetamine use 400%

#### **DHS** Custody

Childbirth- victimization begins

IUGR, Preterm Delivery


Neglect, physical and sexual abuse
54% of girls in foster care report hx sexual abuse
Oklahoma 12,000 in foster care
Most have long term mental health issues

#### **DHS** Custody

In this population of aged out youth: 50% will drop out of school At age 21, only 25% will still be enrolled in school; only 2% will have earned a 2-yeardegree 62% will be unemployed 12-18 months after aging out

#### DHS Custody

In this population of aged out youth: 50% will be unemployed at age 21; median yearly income will be \$5,450 25-33% will become homeless within three years 60-70% will have babies by the age of 21 30% will be arrested between the ages of 18-21



#### **Treatment vs Prevention**


•Foster Care- Comprehensive reforms

- Aide to stay in school or occupation education
- Affordable transitional housing
- Providing sustainable wage employment
- Long-term healthcare and mental health services
- Cost- Billions

#### **Treatment vs Prevention**

#### On the Street

- Housing Projects
- Education and vocational training
- Providing sustainable wage employment
- Healthcare of mental health services, drug recovery and street related physical illnesses
- Cost- Billions



President Nixon stated that "unwanted or untimely childbearing is one of several forces which are driving many families into poverty or keeping them in that condition"

- Three ways of disrupting the Cycle of Abuse
  - Delayed Childbearing
  - Strengthening Marriage
  - Instilling a Sense of Future

#### •Children in Poverty

- Fall behind in almost all cognitive, behavioral, emotional and health measures
- Increasing risk for abuse

•Child Poverty-

To decrease child poverty in the United States, the women must first be raised out of poverty, and to do that, <u>delayed</u> reproduction is essential.

## Norplant

- 1990's- Potential promise by public health officials
- Several states submitted legislation to incentivize woman to use the device
- None of the bills made it out of committee

### Norplant

- Led to charges of coercion
- Argument- "that individuals have a fundamental right to control rather they have children and neither the government nor any individual is entitled to shape or influence a woman's contraceptive choices."

#### **Alternative View**

•Unwanted or mistimed births can have negative effect on the woman as well as others in her care

•It is hard to justify the stance of state noninterference when a person then depends on the state to provide financial support for these births

#### **Alternative View**

•If one is <u>truly</u> committed to raising a woman out of poverty and to increase the chances that her children will have a better life with increase educational and income opportunities, then one must acknowledge society's obligation to help this population achieve delayed reproduction.

# Long Acting Reversible Contraceptives (LARCS)

- Availability- 70% of pregnancies are unintended in single women under 30
  - Multimedia campaigns
  - Easily available- free clinics
  - Free- each delayed birth saves \$24,000
  - Hospital insertions now covered in Oklahoma

# Long Acting Reversible Contraceptives (LARCS)

#### Incentives-

- Increase in welfare benefits
- Shown effectiveness in keeping teenage moms in school

# Long Acting Reversible Contraceptives (LARCS)

#### •Conditional-

- For those who have demonstrated the inability to be able to care for a child
- Drugs
- Criminal Activity
- Proven child neglect or abuse

### Foster Care Schizophrenia

#### •Foster/adoption parent requirements-

- They must be at least 21 years of age
- They can have no history of child abuse, neglect or sexual abuse
- They must be able to provide sufficient bed and space for the child
- They must be able to manage their income to meet the financial needs of the family
- They cannot have any serious felony convictions
- They cannot have a record of possession, use, sale, or distribution of illegal drugs

#### **United Nations**

- Rights of the Child
  - all children, without exception, have the absolute right optimally to develop physically, mentally, morally and spiritually and to be protected from cruelty, neglect and exploitation.

# Long Acting Reversible Contraceptives (LARCS)


- Benefits
  - More likely to finish her education
  - More likely to be employed
  - Better future for her and her children

#### **Push Back**

- Against the fundamental right of nature to reproduce and is an issue of sexual privacy
- Society regulates issues of privacy and sexuality- determines minimal ages for marriage, regulations against rape, prostitution, incest and consanguineous marriage.
- Court ordered disulfiram (Antabuse)- in persons convicted of alcohol related offenses to aid in the maintaining compliance and abstinence from alcohol


### **Medicaid Changes**

- Tubal Ligations
  - Remove 30 Day waiting period

 The collapse in the Middle Class norms concerning marriage and of having children has been a societal catastrophe
 Attraction → Relationship → Deepening Bonds → Marriage → Children

 Low income women tend to reverse the traditional pattern for childbearing

Children → Find or Build Stable Relationship → Possible Marriage

Gender Distrust-

## Marriage

Middle Class Millennials-

also avoiding marriage but without having children

•Fathers Income- would raise about 66% of single mothers out of poverty

•Congress- reduce the marriage penalty in means tested welfare programs

•Government should provide information on the benefits in the form of a multiple media campaign.

#### Two Caste System

Upper Third

Lower Two Thirds

Marriage Education- College Single High School or less

 Marriage has the equivalent effect on reducing poverty as adding 5-6 years of education to a parent

#### Sense of Future

Sense of future- belief that the future holds possibilities and expectations of a better and more fulfilled life. It is the idea that there is something to look forward to that has potential for bettering one's life situation

#### Sense of Future

This is lost with Generational Poverty
Johns Hopkins 30 year study- "The implication is where start in life is where you end up in life."

# Sense of Future

- Low income single mothers commonly view their children as the source for all that they see that is positive in their lives and typically depend on the children as a means of bringing order, companionship, purpose and validation to their often disordered life.
- Children are seen as giving meaning to their lives when meaning can be found nowhere else.
